KIRK SESSION NOTES

The Kirk Session met on 3 October 2018.

Session noted that D Ritchie had attended a meeting with regard to Data Protection organised by Presbytery. The report from the meeting would be discussed at a future meeting.

The War memorial for Aitkenhead UF Parish Church has been constructed from the old Communion table. Session agreed to locate it adjacent to the Memorial on the Glasgow side of the Sanctuary and to dedicate it on Remembrance Sunday.



Session noted that Presbytery had approved in principle works to the Large Hall and also advised that grants had been received from the Ferguson Bequest Fund (£5,000) and the Bellahouston Bequest Fund (£5,000). In addition Presbytery had given approval in principle for the Manse proposal and it was hoped to have discussions with the developer in the near future. The Clerk reported that the Big Lottery had decided to fund in full half of D Wilson's salary. Accordingly the remission in M&M of £3,500 from Presbytery was no longer necessary. Session agreed to advise the Presbytery's Stewardship & Finance Committee of this and to apply for a remission for a different purpose. In relation to the proposed extension, the Clerk advised that a grant had been received from the AllChurches Trust (£2,200).

Session then had a presentation on a possible different approach to pastoral care not involving Elder Districts. The matter would be further discussed.

PRESBYTERY NOTES

Since the last issue of the magazine the Presbytery has met on 19 June, 4 September and 2 October 2018.

The June meeting took place in the Moderator's Church at Wishaw: Craigneuk & Belhaven: the business session being preceded by Communion. The business session was relatively light with business largely being routine.

The Presbytery approved the Property Report which contained approval in principle for Viewpark to proceed in seeking grants for re-slating the Large Hall roof and to further the proposal to redevelop the Manse site. The September session saw the installation of the new Moderator for 2018/2019, Rev Kevin MacKenzie of East Kilbride: Westwood.

Presbytery agreed not to hold a meeting in November.

The sale of the former Carfin buildings was agreed.

Loran Laughlan was welcomed as the new Children and Youth Development Worker.

The October meeting agreed to restore the right of call to Chapelhall lw Kirk O'Shotts after a review – this is a result of a change in church law whereby if a congregation is granted a right of call and no one is called by the end of 2 years there must be a review of that decision.

In addition the Presbytery agreed to oppose a further mandatory cut in the number of posts allocated to the Presbytery; in the case of Hamilton this would amount to the loss of a further 12 posts and the need for a further round of Presbytery planning. Instead the Presbytery opted to accept advisory figures which would indicate what the Presbytery's "fair share" would be of the projected number of ministers available.

Presbytery also agreed to ask Kirk Sessions to consider their training needs to be supported by the Development Officer.

In addition it was noted that places were available for Bereavement and Funeral training.

CAP is now working at full capacity and, I must say, it is a pleasure to be part of a Church team that offers practical help to everyone in our community.

My batteries were low before I travelled the many miles to Blackburn for our annual conference. As I arrived at the venue the warmth of my colleagues started to filter through to me. Exchanging stories about ordinary people like you and me meeting Jesus was a great start. The first day was filled with great worship, on a par with our Viewpark band. It was so refreshing to see so many people just thanking God for his Son.

The main speaker was a Church-planting pastor from London. The very real account of his Churches in Essex was fantastic. We all, I think, have that voice in us that just makes us move to do things. Some call it a form of prophesy or a word in the Spirit that needs to come out and lead us to the will of Jesus. Sometimes this happens when we are at the lowest point as a Christian and we feel embarrassed to do Christian work, whatever that is. That week, at the conference, people looking on may have struggled to know that I was a Christian. However, God can and does still use us, even when we feel this way.

The young pastor at the conference painted a picture of how his Church looks. Instead of being a perfect circle with all the people safely in the circle he drew something that looked like this:-



It was meant to show that we are all different, but we're all on a journey either going towards Jesus or going away from Jesus. When Jesus met people he did not judge them but accepted them all. From the rich young ruler to the tax collector, he accepted everyone. He never changed his stance against sin, but he cared so much for us he gave us this chance to get back to God by accepting his offer of redemption and inviting him into our lives. We let him down often but what the pastor reminded us all is - we are all equal in God's eyes. 'A// have sinned and fall short of the glory of God' (Romans 3:23). Some of our sin is there for the Daily Record and BBC etc to see, but many hidden sins are there too. The parable of the puffed up Pharisee praying loudly and thanking God that he is not like 'these sinners' (Luke 18:10-14) is a great lesson to us all.

We are so blessed with the fantastic mixed bag of failed people which is known as Viewpark Parish Church. We know that we are here not to teach people to become 'middle class' or 'good people' but to tell people about the love and sacrifice of Jesus.

UPDATING THE CHURCH WAR MEMORIALS



The War memorial for Aitkenhead UF Church has been finished. This replaces the rather shabby paper version that was in a frame dating back to 1923. The new memorial has been made from the former communion table which used to sit below the pulpit (where the cross on the south wall is now). It is a fitting reminder of the twenty-four young men who went off gallantly to fight for their country in the First World War, innocent of the horrors that lay in front of them, and who never came home to their families. It was also putting to good use an otherwise redundant piece of furniture that served the church well in the past and was currently gathering dust in a cupboard. Unfortunately, the communion table's original history is unknown.

There has now been considerable research carried out regarding the men named on all three war memorials in the Church. The other two war memorials are from the Bothwell Park UF Church, situated on the left hand side of the south wall, and from The Thornwood Mission Church (as the present church was previously known).

The longer term plan is to create a booklet in the church library giving a short history of each man: where each was born; where he went to school; where he lived; who his family was and, of course, where and when he died.

This may be added at a later date as an extension to the church web page for everybody to view. This extension will name all the local men from the Tannochside Area, not just from our own church, who died during the First World War. Some of the men have known graves in foreign lands, mostly in Europe but some further afield. Others have no known grave. They are just names on vast memorials in France and Belgium. And some were fortunate to return, only to die at home or in military hospitals.

An even longer-term plan is to create a lasting memorial fixed to the brick wall at Tannochside Gate opposite Scotmid. This plan will need outside funding such as lottery money or landfill trust funding. Much careful thought needs to given to this project and this will take time.
