PRESBYTERY NOTES

Since the last issue of the magazine the Presbytery met on 3 September 2019 and 1 October 2019.

The September meeting noted that Rev James Munton celebrated the 50th anniversary of his Ordination. It also noted the retirement of Rev Douglas Wallace. Rev Maxine Buck was installed as Moderator.

The Moderator led the Presbytery in a time of prayer and reflection in response to the call of the General Assembly of 2019 to set time aside for a Season of Prayer in response to the Radical Action Plan and the significant restructuring of the National Church.

It was noted that the Kirk Session of Bothwell voted to depart from the historic position of the Church in relation to human sexuality.

It was agreed to raise East Kilbride: Stewartfield to full status.

The October meeting heard tribute paid following the deaths of Mr Peter Chirnside (Presbytery Elder, Bargeddie) and Rev Alasdair Gordon (retired).

Again the Moderator led the Presbytery in a time of prayer and reflection in response to the call of the General Assembly of 2019 (see above).

Presbytery supported the raising of East Kilbride: Greenhills to full status.

Presbytery also authorised a reduction in our Ministry & Mission contributions for 2020 of £6000 to offset the salary costs of the ViewCare Coordinator.

Time to Breathe suspension of services

I thought I would take the time to give an update on the discussions during the CAP annual conference at York University.

CAP provided the background of what happened to neccesitate the recent suspension of services (which re-started in November).

In February the BBC ran a documentary on the life of John Kirby and CAP. The following Tuesday there was a spike in appointments producing a record of over 400 families signing up to CAP in one day.

Another factor is the type of debt that we are dealing with. Priority debt, covering legal action for recovery of house rent, council tax etc. has grown from 35% to over 46%. This has resulted in more clients requiring bankruptcy or sequestration rather than repayment plans. Clients with more complex cases require a 4th visit or more as they struggle with the stigma of bankruptcy and how they are perceived by family and friends. This has caused delays in assisting clients out of debt.

Lastly, the percentage of clients with complex mental health issues has also increased.

It became obvious to CAP that the delays for clients were not acceptable. Working with the existing clients and putting things in place to ensure this does not happen again, the core leadership team has implemented a plan to make our systems more robust for the future. They have recently recruited 14 debt counsellors and have also put in place additional systems and investment at the head office to progress the backlog.

At the conference they provided and extended a Q and A session specifically for all debt centre managers which allowed us a chance to run through the new system changes including a new independent option.

Our centre was already running at 100% and I took the time during suspension to run a CAP money course with Lesley. I will report on how the course went in the next magazine.

Bishop Philip North Blackburn Church of England

Bishop Philip was the Lead Speaker at the conference and I quote directly from what he said:-

"In many of our urban communities, four new Horsemen of the Apocalypse are at

large, taunting, tormenting, pillaging, reducing lives to misery. The first horseman is low pay.

The second horseman is universal credit. With its long waits and punitive systems of sanctions, so-called welfare reform is stripping lives of dignity and causing appalling levels of stress and anxiety. And the bitter irony is that the benefits system is subsidising the culture of low pay because about three quarters of it is paid to families who are in work.

The third horseman is hunger. It is astonishing to think that in 2019 in the fifth largest economy in the world, we are unable to feed our own children. A few months ago one of our priests buried a child who had apparently died of malnutrition. 600,000 people a year are dependent on the indignity of food handouts.

And the fourth horseman is the one that you will all be familiar with which is debt. It's the natural corollary of a culture of low pay. Some fall into debt simply because they don't want their children to be hungry. Others fall for the lies of a happy life peddled by the likes of Brighthouse. For others, stress and misery drive them into addiction.

And you will all know full well the consequences of debt in terms of family life, mental health and the quality of relationships."

When the bishop spoke, the conference was electrified by his words and the very mention of Universal Credit caused a roar of derision. The working poor and the allowance of zero-hour contracts is continuing to allow the poor to be marginalised and creating dependence.

Is our Helping Hurting?

Armed with the bishop's words, CAP provided many workshops and lectures and the theme that most struck me was "Is Our Helping Hurting?" We were encouraged to avoid the pitfalls of 'saviour complex' and of dependency culture.

One speaker described what he noticed with his Christmas hamper service. The pastor told us that when the Church turned up to deliver the Christmas hamper, the fathers seemed never to be present. Whilst most mothers were grateful for the gifts and the immediate relief for this one meal, they too were sometimes quiet.

This pastor realised that his system was robbing these fathers of the dignity they had in providing for their families at Christmas and, indeed, it was compounding their feelings of failure.

Instead he decided to encourage the creation of a community shop, employing local people, and with stock being supplied by individuals but sold at prices which provided just enough to pay for the staff. Thus the clients can now purchase presents at a very low cost, wrap them up for *their* kids and feel themselves empowered.

As we seek to provide more and more hampers each year I know Shona has had pressure from people asking "where's my hamper?" Having the time to engage with clients to remove this dependency culture is hard but already we have started to do this at ViewCare. Debbie introduced a system to review clients who seem to be becoming dependent on our food bank.

A suitable time is chosen to gently ask what is happening so that the correct help can be sought to move them away long-term from dependence on the food bank. You can imagine I felt some relief that we are ahead of the curve with a heart to empower people rather than endorse a broken system.



We have plans already in place to improve the services at Viewcare. We wish to provide clients with confidentiality at every stage. However I am concerned that clients suffer by being helped by our teams in full view of everyone in the Church office. And surely it is not right that they sometimes have to come into the café and ask where is the food bank? The improvement in the work so far is great and every service is so much better. But the dream of a dedicated area for clients to visit in confidence is still at the forefront of my mind.

This morning I received an email from North Lanarkshire Council reminding me that one of the horses of the Apocalypse was about to start grazing on our patch. Universal Credit loans are available from the council to assist clients.

I know from working with clients under Universal Credit that immediate problems are created with housing arrears and, believe it or not, water debt. If CAP has noticed a problem with increased demand, then it is only prudent that we take steps to increase our provision over all of our ViewCare systems. To allow us to develop our services we require more space and dignity for clients. The sacrifice of generations gone by in the building of Churches for worship and, indeed, for education and provision for the poor is nothing new. We have a plan - lets make sure we follow through.

Where is the Spirit?

I continue to be impressed by people, some of whom I have never even met. So many show great humility and this is something that should always be present when we have a heart to help.

Recently I took a call from a friend in the accountancy world. My friend had heard of the work of ViewCare and wanted to set up a direct monthly credit from his firm's charity. As a Chartered Accountancy firm, he charges clients for monthly seminars on client development. Working with Debbie, he will send over this income on the understanding that this will be used for client aid in our community. This additional money will add to the coffers for Debbie Wilson and David Alexander to secure more funding for the long term.

The Spirit goes with us to continue in this ministry to serve the poor with the Church across the country. I am so encouraged by your work, action and prayer in this ministry.

Next year we plan to return to South Newton, near Kilmacolm.

In August 2020, five Guides are going to Camp Brave, a large international camp on the outskirts of Edinburgh. We know that Guides (or Girl Scouts) from USA, Canada, Mexico and Poland will be there and they're looking forward to an amazing experience. The two Guide units went to the Tartan Gig in August. There were 10,000 guides all dancing and singing along to The Vamps, Maisie Peters, Lewis Capaldi, Becky Hill and James Arthur. It was fantastic!

We are settling in to our new programme, getting used to Skills Builders (the patrols are working on Network and Make Change at the moment) and Unit Meeting Activities (recent ones have been Bank or Bust, Bird Feeder, HELP and Macramé Master). The Guides are working towards their Bronze, Silver and Gold badges.
