Daniel Boone, the famous American frontiersman, was once asked, "Have you ever gotten lost in the wilderness?" He said, "No, I've never been lost. I've been bewildered for weeks at a time, but I've never been lost."

Maybe you feel bewildered right now. Don't be discouraged! Don't give up! Look up. Turn to prayer. I have had many, many requests in my life that I've prayed to God that have never been answered. I can think of one prayer that I have prayed almost every day for years, and it hasn't been answered. I don't know why God hasn't chosen to answer that prayer, and I don't understand it.

But I have decided this: whether or not God ever answers that prayer, I am going to die believing his promises.

Because God is a good God, and he knows what's best, even when I don't understand it.

When God doesn't answer your prayers, you need to remember a couple of important truths.

First, God is in control, and you're not. He knows better what you need than you do. There is no mountain too tall that he can't move it. There is no problem so big that he can't solve it. There is no sorrow so deep he cannot soothe it. God is in control, and he has a plan.

The second thing you need to remember is that, whether or not you ever receive your answer, God will honour your patience — if not in this world, then in eternity.

KIRK SESSION NOTES

The Kirk Session met on 13 February, 4 March and 18 March 2018.

At the meeting on 13th February:

Session noted the resignation of Alison Tobias as Organist.

Session noted with pleasure that 4 new members would be admitted by Profession of Faith.

Session agreed to apply to the Garfield Weston Foundation for a grant towards the cost of the proposed extension to the rear of the Church in support of the ViewCare Project. Session noted that a condition of the application was that planning permission was in place -Session thus also agreed that a planning application should be submitted.

It was also agreed to seek permission to re-slate and repair the Large Hall roof and to seek grants for that purpose.

Session considered a proposal to redevelop the manse site to locate 3 houses, one of which would become the Manse. Agreement was given in principle, conditional on plans being fully developed and discussions to take place with the Presbytery and General Trustees. The meeting on 4 March was convened to approve transferring the Church bank account from Royal Bank of Scotland as a result of the proposed closure of the local branch to the Bank of Scotland in Uddingston.

The meeting on 18 March was convened to approve the Accounts for 2017. The Treasurer highlighted the main points in the Accounts for 2017 stressing that a positive balance had been achieved and that the finances of the Church were in good order. Following questions the Session approved the Accounts.

In addition the Clerk sought the permission of Session to pay £20,000 to the View 21 Loan ahead of the September deadline thus saving some interest on the loan; to earmark £10,000 from the General Fund towards the cost of the proposed ViewCare extension; and to earmark £5,000 from the General Fund towards the cost of replacing the roof of the Large Hall. Session concurred.

PRESBYTERY NOTES

Since the last issue of the magazine the Presbytery has met on 6 March and 1 May 2018.

The March meeting was one of the shortest meetings, lasting for about one hour only. Business conducted was largely routine.

Commissioners were appointed to the General Assembly and this included my own appointment to represent Viewpark.

Presbytery noted that Rev Hannah Rankin would be ordained to Airdrie: Clarkston.

The May meeting opened with a number of tributes to Ministers celebrating anniversaries including to Michael who is celebrating the silver jubilee of his ordination;

to Rev W Stewart, retiring from Glasford lw Strathaven: East;

and following the deaths of a long serving Presbytery Elder and a Reader. Presbytery noted the Service of Introduction to be held on 31 May for Strathaven: Trinity formed from Strathaven: Rankin, Strathaven: East, Glasford and Chapelton – a union of 3 places of worship.

Presbytery noted my own appointment as Moderator in the vacant charge of Wishaw: Old.

Work was approved at Hamilton: Cadzow at around £600,000 for stonework, roof and window repairs.

Rev Kevin MacKenzie, East Kilbride: Westwood was elected as Moderator for next session.

Viewpark received £3500 in remission of Ministry and Mission dues to go towards the costs of the ViewCare Coordinator.

I think that's summer now. Weather is unpredictable and so are people. The thing I love about the Gospel is that it covers every unpredictable character. From the rich ruler to the poor widow, Jesus made a difference to every person he came across. Outward appearances can be deceptive and sometimes people dress in a certain way to ensure other people don't engage with them.

At CAP we are trained to ensure we include EVERYONE in our community. Who is our neighbour?

CAP at Viewpark has really been booked out solid. We have taken on more appointments than ever and, with the fantastic team work here at the Church, I expect this to increase. Debbie Wilson is a catalyst for this bringing each area that we reach out to our community together to encourage signposting and to focus on why we do this work. I am looking forward to inviting colleagues from the DWP to find out the details about the foodbank, clothes bank, throughcare scheme and our Church.

We really are only a sticking plaster on an open wound, but the chance to speak to people about Jesus whilst we put on the lights, feed and clothe them, gives everyone a chance to hear that people care about them too.

CAP's patron, Rt Hon Justin Welby, read to the House of Lords our 2018 report on what happens when clients engage with CAP. Here are some numbers:-

37% of CAP clients were afraid to leave the house before CAP's help.76% of those in relationships said debt affected their relationship negatively.35% considered or attempted suicide as a way out of debt.

When we were studying in the 40 days of prayer at our Church we asked God specifically in prayer for a number of items. My prayer was for CAP to open more centres in the poverty capital of the UK ie GLASGOW. Yesterday, at the Church of the Nazerene, a couple expressed a desire to become debt centre managers at that Church.

Whilst this is a joyous time, with an answer to prayer earlier in the month, I was saddened when one of my clients died. For all of his life, this client could not read or write and was in and out of prison. My last visit to him was to drop off food and clothes, donated by our Church, with Fiona Cunningham. I am proud to stand beside all my clients regardless of where they have been and what they have done. Thanks again to my befrienders who are the real workers here - getting alongside clients and telling them that this Church cares 24/7.

We have a Saviour who cares about them and holds them in His arms when things are too much. We can never replace the state system of care, and do not attempt to do so. We are only really a sticking plaster on an open wound. We are, however, carriers of a message from God and, when appropriate, we tell people in need that God knows and loves them too.

We currently need more befrienders, and I would love to open more services in our Church. Please talk to me if you are interested. It is so rewarding. Yours in Him.

YOU'RE WELCOME CLOTHING & HOME BANK

The last few months have been incredibly busy for us. We have now helped well over 600 individuals and expect to have provided 500 parcels by our 2nd anniversary on 1st July.

We have been supporting a sweet lady for over a year now; she fled an abusive situation with her children and came to us with nothing. She brought her daughter in a few months ago when she couldn't afford to treat her and we managed to pack a bag of goodies and make a fuss of her for the afternoon. More recently she came for clothing for her children and told us that she has cancer.

She is still in an extremely vulnerable position personally and I would ask that you pray for her healing and strength for the months ahead. Pray too for all those who come to us for help, and for the volunteers who do such a good job keeping the Bank running smoothly.

UPDATING THE CHURCH WAR MEMORIALS



With the 100th anniversary of the armistice of 1918 coming up in November this year, I have been doing some research into the accuracy of the names on the three First World War memorials found in Viewpark Parish Church. Two of these war memorials can be found on the south wall - the white marble one on the left is from the former Bothwell Park UF Church, now demolished, which was situated approximately where Viewpark Autos is now. The other one is from Viewpark Parish Church (then called Thornwood Mission Station) which was an annex

to Park Church in Uddingston Main Street. The third memorial was from Aitkenhead UF Church which was situated just right of Scotmid and was demolished to make way for the Caterpillar plant. This memorial is handwritten on paper, framed in a simple frame and currently kept in the church office.

There are a total of 59 soldiers' names on these memorials, some of which are proving rather difficult to identify as there is a proliferation of names on related web pages but nothing to identify their places of origin. Major sources of information were the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, The Scottish National War Memorial, and the National Archives at Kew. Some other information has been uncovered locally from old newspapers, wills or death certificates. However, many, as yet, remain unknown.

While researching these 59 soldiers, I have uncovered information on many other men in this locality whose names, perhaps, should have been on these memorials and I hope, in the longer term, to create a new War Memorial at Tannochside Gate (on the brick wall opposite Scotmid) incorporating all the names of those who should be remembered.
